Dental Hygienist – the main duties include providing dental related advice, information, and treatments to prevent and treat tooth decay and gum disease. In comparison to a dentist, the dental hygienist is the expert who will evaluate the oral health and apply preventive treatment.

Day to day tasks

- Clean and polish teeth to help prevent tooth decay.

- Apply fluoride and sealant treatments to reduce decay.

- Remove plaque.

- Give local anaesthetic under the supervision of a dentist.

- Apply temporary coatings and sealants to protect teeth.

- Encourage and demonstrate tooth brushing and flossing.

- Sterilise equipment.

- Check and maintain patient records.
