Exotic Animal Veterinarian – An exotic animal veterinarian specialises in non-domestic animals such as zoo animals, wildlife, and exotic pets, including reptiles, birds, fish and amphibians. Their principal duties include diagnosing and treating illnesses or injuries, vaccinating animals, and completing other tasks to support the health of animals working with

Day to day tasks

- Diagnose and treat sick and injured animals

- Perform operations

- Carry out blood analyses, Xrays, and scans.

- Provide care for animals in veterinary hospitals.

- Carry out regular health checks and give vaccines.

Salary

Starting salary for basic veterinarians are typically between £31,232 and £38,480. When you specialise as an exotic animal vet, the income will depend on experience and where you practice. Zoo vets can earn between £41,000 and £131,000.
