What is it?

Chartered surveyors are professionals who assess and report on the condition of land, buildings, and other types of property. They provide advice on property-related issues such as construction, maintenance, and repair. Chartered surveyors can also provide valuations of properties for various purposes such as taxation, insurance, and sale.

Qualifications/Experience Required:

You must either complete a Chartered Surveyors Degree. Or achieve 5 – 10 years relevant experience.

You will require 3 A Levels or relevant BTEC/SQA You will require 5 GCSEs grades 6 and above including English and Maths

What the Work Involves:

You will offer professional advice to clients within the field of surveying. You will examine plans, designs and project briefs, taking measurements, recording and analysing data and interpreting it through charts, maps etc.
