What is it?

A fashion designer is a creative professional who thinks of ideas and creates clothing, accessories, and footwear. They are responsible for designing garments that reflect current fashion trends, meet market demands, and appeal to target audiences. Fashion designers work in various settings, including fashion houses, design studios, retail companies, and manufacturing firms.

Qualifications/Experience Required:

You typically need a degree in fashion design or a related field from a reputable art or design school. Building a strong portfolio showcasing your design aesthetic and technical skills is essential for securing employment in the competitive fashion industry. Additionally, gaining experience through internships, apprenticeships, or entry-level positions can provide valuable insights into the industry and help you develop your design expertise.

Sketching and creating design prototypes using computer-aided design (CAD) software or traditional methods. Selecting fabrics, colours, and embellishments to create cohesive collections that reflect the brand's aesthetic. Collaborating with pattern makers, sample makers, and garment technicians to bring designs to life.

Future Prospects – Labour Market Information:

The fashion industry is highly competitive, with opportunities available for talented designers who demonstrate creativity, innovation, and market relevance. Entry level positions are more limited and competitive.

Money/Wage Guide:

The fashion industry is highly competitive, initially you can expect to earn around £20,000 to £25,000 per year. With experience and expertise, this can increase to £40,000. Established fashion designers or those with their own labels may earn significantly higher salaries.
