

## Production Worker

### What is it?

Production workers perform the steps necessary for an item to be created, like feeding raw materials into machinery, assembling goods on production lines, and monitoring the process.

### Qualifications/Experience Required:

There are no set entry requirements, but previous experience on a production line or in a warehouse might be helpful.

You could get into this job through an apprenticeship.

### What the Work Involves:

Your day-to-day duties could include following assembly instructions, putting together parts in the right order, re-stocking supplies for your work area and reporting problems to your team leader.

You may also be required to carrying out simple quality checks or packing goods ready for dispatch. Depending on the item you are producing, your tasks might vary.

### Future Prospects – Labour Market Information:

With experience, you could become a production line team leader, shift supervisor, or work in quality control.
