What is it?

An animator is a creative professional who brings characters, scenes, and stories to life through animation. They use a variety of techniques, including traditional hand-drawn animation, computer-generated imagery (CGI), and stop-motion animation, to create visual effects for films, television shows, video games, advertisements, and other multimedia projects.

Qualifications/Experience Required:
